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

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A question often asked is "how are the catalogue cover photos chosen?"

Catalogue covers are chosen from materials submitted by exhibitors, first, on the basis of the reproductable quality of the image (resolution and sharpness) and second, on the visual impact of the subject matter.

From 2013 on, I swore up and down and to the ends of the earth, there would never be a photograph of either a child or an animal used as a SPARK cover image. This was a point of pride. In the editorial and advertising world, when the creative juices run dry as they often do without proper lubrication, you simply went with a baby or a cute animal. Who doesn't like babies or cute animals? Or for an even larger splash, a baby with a cute animal? Consider the kitten? Last time I checked there were close to 36 million photos and 20 million videos of kittens uploaded to the internet. Are there that many kittens on the entire planet? And why do we need so many images of them?

It didn't take long to be eating humble pie, as in 2014, to many cringe worthy words of praise and accolade, I featured a double image of two-year old Jackie Fairbairn on the cover. I masked my shame by rambling on about the historical significance of the photograph, noting its post-modern subject matter characterizing it as an inquiry into identity. Never again I promised myself, and for a period, I resisted the natural attraction for cuteness that rears up like a twoheaded monster when faced with deadlines and indecisiveness.

Four years passed with nary a baby or cute animal in sight. Last year of course there was the famous hound dog along with its master, a Northumberland farmer, a photo by Gary Mulcahey, but that doesn't count, hound dogs being neither cute or kittenish. So this year against my better judgement, stomach in knots over the thought of choking down another serving of humble pie, I chose a photo of a grizzly bear by Barb Callander.

Wildlife photography is tough. Simply to get a sharp image is often the goal. While I appreciate the technical skill, the gargantuan buckets of patience required to crouch uncomfortably in a damp cold buggy environment, the sleep deprived early morning drive to be on location before the animal or bird awakes to its hunger alarm, and the vast knowledge of habitat and animal behaviour that goes into a good wildlife photograph, most wildlife photos (except of insects oddly) leave me, well - disappointed.

What is it about this bear and its salmon, and why is it on the cover?

First off, I was intrigued by how the bear seems to be gently cradling the salmon in its arms like a small precious baby. The bear's gaze is concentrated lovingly on the salmon, or is it?. While the contrast of the brightly coloured salmon compared to the understated brown tones of the bear and background draw you into the frame, it doesn't take long for your eye to settle on the bear's impressive set of claws. This salmon is not long for this world. The salmon is having a sort of David Byrne moment, its big red eye seems to be asking the question "how did I get here?" The tension between what seems at first glance a "cute" photo, and the violence you know will soon follow, is what intrigues me about this photo, as does the unanswered question of the next frame. Will the salmon flop and get away? Or will the bear be licking its chops?

As a way of acknowledgeing and celebrating all the wildlife and nature photographers who exhibit their work at SPARK, I decided the bear deserved its' moment. Many photographers begin their exploration of photography as a way of documenting and sharing the beauty of wildlife and of the natural world. Some, like Barb Callander, having mastered wildlife photography techniques, want their images to inform, educate and advocate about environments and animals at risk - in Barb's case, Northern environments.

In addition to nature, two thematic threads wind through the fabric of the 2018 SPARK exhibits and activities; youth and community.

After developing a photography program for newcomer children (age 8 to 11) in partnership with the New Canadians Centre in 2017, parents approached the NCC asking for a similar program for youth (age 12 to 18). The program required advanced technology in terms of cameras, and a challenging program to keep teenagers engaged. SPARK was fortunate to have several funders step up. After a small preview at ReFrame, a larger comprehensive exhibit of the youth photography will be shown at the Publican House during SPARK.

When not in use, cameras used in the newcomer programs, are loaned to other programs such as the two described below.

Cyrstal Hebert continues to run her photography program at the Yes Shelter called a Way Home Peterborough, with a youth focus on homelessness. You can see that exhibit at Pappas Billiards.

Highland Heights Public School, in partnership with the NeighbourPLAN project and GreenUP, also borrowed the SPARK cameras for a group of senior kindergarten, grade 1 and grade 2 students to take a closer look at their community through

photography and other activiites.

Though not highly publicized, SPARK continues to challenge TAS photography students with an annual poster contest where the top prize besides bragging rights, is an extra large Night Kitchen pizza.

The Best of High School Photography Exhibit, started by Erin Burke, SPARK's co-op student from 2016-17, will continue in 2018 thanks to the efforts of secondary school student Owen Nabuurs. SPARK is now sponsoring the exhibit as a primary exhibit with the hope that it will become a permanent feature of the festival. SPARK is extremely proud of the work Owen has done, his organizational skills and a getit-done attitude. One of the most commented on and appreciated exhibits in 2017, we are thrilled to have a student take ownership and responsibility for presenting the 2018 exhibit, which is no small task. The exhibit will be at PCVS.

SPARK SPiN will be back for a second year, starting a little later in the month of April, as the first riders last year had to cycle through a snow storm. Thanks to Lindsay Stroud at GreenUp for her efforts in planning and leading some of the routes.

Off season, SPARK worked on two major photographic projects for the City of Peterborough.

After review of SPARK catalogues, the Waste Management Division selected a list of SPARK exhibitors to submit a portfolio of community images for the 2018 Waste Reduction and Conservation Calendar. SPARK managed the invitations to submit portfolios, image specs, rights agreements, payment, and file organization and transfers, delivering over 200 images for selection. The resulting calendar is a beautiful testament to the skill of SPARK's exhibiting photographers.

SPARK's second off-season project for the City's Art, Culture and Hertiage Division, was to photographically document all four days of the Canada 150 activities. Logistically complicated due to over 72 separate events and locations, a team of SPARK photographers was assembled and worked tirelessly to achieve a comprehensive and permanent public record of the events. A city selected sampling of printed images from the archive can be seen at the Public Library at an exhibit called *Our Peterborough*.

The back cover features one of those photographs - a photo of Beau Dixon performing during the Hunter street dance as photographed by Peter Curley. As an expression of pure energy, there is none better.



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
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

She also has a degree in Microbiology from the University of Guelph.

Since 2007 she has exhibited and sold her composite photographs in festivals and galleries in the Kawarthas, where she is based, and in Toronto, & Ottawa. Her work was included in the Art Gallery of Peterborough's 2012 Triennial Exhibition. She was an Artist In Residence in 2014 at Quetico Provincial Park near Thunderbay Ontario. The Elaine Fleck Gallery in Toronto exhibited her work in 2015. Corin was pleased to show work in the SPARK juried exhibition in 2017.

Taking photographs is only the first step in Corin's art process. She has a passion for integrating multiple photos to create new images that encourage reflection on the beauty and sacredness of the natural world. In her most recent work she creates geometric patterns and shapes digitally. Areas are then filled with photographic textures, such as stone and water, carefully considering colour, design, lighting and symmetry.

Finished pieces resemble stained glass, mandalas and traditional symbols that have been used for centuries by different cultures. Such icons have been used as a spiritual guide or aid during meditation. Corin's work provides a conduit for viewing our planet's complex ecology with respect and its beauty with reverence.

My SPARK exhibit images have all been taken in mainland Australia and Tasmania during caravan travels over the past three Canadian winters. This past season was spent exclusively in Tasmania.

There is a certain nostalgic feel for me in Australia and very especially in Tasmania. In fact, I found a time and place reminiscent of my childhood in the 50's and 60's in Peterborough. Communities we explored were typically small and unhurried; businesses were often mom and pop; cars were infrequent and people unfailingly open and helpful.

The surrounding landscape was expansive and beautiful, sometimes with great undulating hills of pasture and forest, sometimes with plains revealing endless skies. Enormous stretches were undeveloped. This all felt evocative to me – a time half remembered.

As a developing photographer, I have learned that to truly see the elements of design and beauty which surround us all, requires the present moment; and I think we have this seeing more easily and naturally as children. The unhurried pace and beauty in Australia and Tasmania reminded and encouraged me in this early ability and awareness.

Many of my images in this exhibit have featured elements of open and natural space discovered there as I explored both my past and present.





As a wildlife photographer with a passion to educate through my images and rooted in my fascination with the Canadian North, this year I continued my quest to bring awareness of northern species at risk, venturing into the interior BC's Chilcotin region in search of BC Grizzlies.

On the inland lea of the Coastal Mountains, bordered by the Fraser River and known to the Chilcotin people as Red Ochre River, the Chilko River and Lake region is the largest natural, high elevation, freshwater lake in North America. Western Hemlock, Red Cedar and old growth Douglas Fir stand like sentinels, protecting herds of Bighorn Sheep, Mountain Goats, Mule Deer and Bears. Ravaged by wildfires and under pressure from declining salmon stocks, the Grizzly Bears



persevere, arriving at the Chiko River in the fall. Drawn by the salmon run, Grizzlies build energy for their winter hibernation, lasting up to 7 months. Born during hibernation, cubs are sightless and hairless relying on their mother's energy reserves to sustain life. Calm around people unless startled or threatened, I had the privilege to observe a mother Grizzly and her 3 cubs, sharing in their daily routine of play, sniffing the air to sense possible danger with a keen sense of smell and fishing for nutrient rich salmon. Like young siblings, I watched as the cubs tussled, squabbled and rumbled, chastised by their mother for falling behind or stealing her dinner.

Join me at Frameland Frame it For U for a window into the world of this apex predator and her young family.

At its best photographic art is of two minds: in the first instance it is a faithful record of physical reality while striving to transcend that reality. The first part of this equation is rooted in technique, namely, choice and framing of subject matter, sensors, lenses and digital editing. Mastering all of these elements is hard enough but transcendence of subject puts this game on an unpredictable playing field. Transcendence or "equivalence" as elucidated by Alfred Stieglitz and more eloquently by Minor White is the ability of the image to illicit an elevated mood or feeling that goes beyond subject matter. Our response need not be definable or quantifiable but will entail a sense of "awe". Transcendence in photographic art parallels what poetry is to prose. And like poetry it can only be bestowed not manufactured.





Artist Statement



My home/studio is in the rolling hills of Northumberland County near the Arts Designated Community of Warkworth. This contoured landscape coincidentally matches the relief of the countryside of Northumberland and Yorkshire where I grew up.

With design and art related careers and an arts education from NSCAD (Nova Scotia College of Art & Design University) my earlier two and three dimensional creations are known internationally. My current mixed media work focuses on presenting photography that more closely matches the way we see landscapes with our eyes. To bring these creations to life I embellish these scenes with soaring, hand painted crows.

My photographic landscapes are wide horizontals providing multiple vanishing points, approaching a truer visual realism. The resultant photography is giclee printed on archival canvas, stretched and mounted in a shadow frame. It is at that stage that I set to work with paints in my studio. Each picture is heightened with frolicsome crows. For me it is most enthralling to capture how these cunning creatures may interact with the land forms in my compositions.

Nancy Towns spent half her life working in various parts of the Americas and Europe before recently returning to the place of her childhood, Douro Ontario to co-found Towns & Leahy Mercantile and Deli. From her time growing up in her family's general store, P.G. Towns & Sons established in 1892 by her great grandfather, to collaborating with small scale producers and business owners during her travels as a guide and researcher for Toronto based cycle touring company Butterfield & Robinson. Her experience with food and small business both here and far has shown her a common thread – food connects people with people and people with place.









Highland Road for Kids, for All

In partnership with the NeighbourPLAN project and GreenUP a group of senior kindergarten, grade 1 and grade 2 students from Highland Heights Public School take a closer look at their community.



Students embark upon an exploration of traditional photography and darkroom techniques, as they explore the world through the camera lens.

The images they make embody the spirit of the beginning and end of a five month relationship - their first experience with a pinhole camera - and culminates with what they consider their best photograph.

Students first work with a cardboard box, making a pinhole image (oddly, not being able to see through the lens at all!). What emerges is a surprise, an initial realization of their search for interesting subjects full of contrast and natural design.

Subsequently, upon experiencing reality through the viewfinder of a 35mm camera, they navigate their way through a world of image and sensation, gaining greater autonomy and more fully informed control over the final photographic product.

Through the Lens suggests working through a process - coming out the other side with newly discovered vision, experience, and confidence.

Ultimately, students emerge from the film photography class having observed, absorbed and processed the potential unconventional beauty of a street corner, an abandoned yard or a secluded figure with a newfound understanding of the form, content and significance of the everyday.
